Activity One - Discussion Questions..

- Do you ever wonder about what might have happened if things had been different?
- Do you think about the past much?
- What would you like to have changed in your recent past? (The last month).



Activity Two - Read about REAL AND UNREAL CONDITIONALS...

'Past real conditionals'.

- ▶ If/when..... SIMPLE PAST..., ...SIMPLE PAST..
- ▶ ...SIMPLE PAST...if/when....SIMPLE PAST..

We use the past **real** conditional to describes what we used to in **real** life situations. This tense suggests that your habits or behavior today is different to what they were in the past.

Examples:

- When I went to parties, I normally **drank** a lot of beer. Now I'm sober.
- When I had a day off during college I often **went** to the beach. Nowadays I never really get the time
- My dad always **helped** me with my maths homework when he **had** the time. But now he doesn't have the time.

Important to note - The expression "used to" is often used to express the idea that something was an old habit that stopped in the past. This is commonly used in Past Real Conditional sentences to emphasize that something was a habit. The examples below have the same meaning:

- When I went to parties, I **used to drink** a lot of beer. Now I'm sober.
- When I had a day off during college **I used to go** to the beach. Nowadays I never really get the time.
- My dad **used to help** me with my maths homework when he **had** the time.

IF / When

- ▶ If- suggest something happened less frequently
- ▶ When- suggests something happened often.





Past Unreal Conditional

- ▶ (If..... Past Perfect...., ...would have + past participle..)
- ▶ (..would have + past participle..if...Past Perfect..)

The Past Unreal Conditional is used to talk about imaginary situations in the past. You can describe what you would have done differently or how something could have happened differently if circumstances had been different.

Examples:

- If I **had owned** a car, I **would have driven** to work. But I didn't have one, so I took the tram.
- I **would have read** more as a child if I **hadn't watched** so much TV. Unfortunately, I did watch a lot of TV, so I never read for entertainment.
- Dan **would have gotten** the job and **moved** to Japan if she **had studied** Japanese in school instead of Dutch
- If Dan **had worked** harder, he **would have earned** more money. Unfortunately, he was lazy and he didn't earn much.

Important- Only the word "if" is used with the Past Unreal Conditional because you are discussing imaginary situations. "When" cannot be used.

Examples:

- I would have bought that computer **when** it had been cheaper. **Not Correct**
- I would have bought that computer **if** it had been cheaper. **Correct**

EXCEPTION Conditional with Modal Verbs

There are some special conditional forms for modal verbs in English:

would have + can = could have

would have + shall = should have

would have + may = might have

The words "can," "shall" and "may" cannot be used with "would have." Instead, they must be used in these special forms.

Examples:

- If I had gone to Egypt, I **could have learned** Arabic.
- If she had had time, she **might have gone** to the party.

The words "could," "should," "might" and "ought to" include Conditional, so you cannot combine them with "would have."

Examples:

- If I had had more time, I **could have exercised** after work.
- If he had invited you, you **might have gone**.

Activity Four - What If History?

"What If" history is a branch of history where people speculate, argue and write essays about what might have happened if a crucial event of history had turned out differently. It is not considered a serious form of historical analysis but it is a fun way to imagine how the world might be different and also to practice our past conditionals. 1. What would have happened if the Southern states won the American civil war?
2. What would have happened if the Soviet Union had not collapsed?
3. What would have happened if President Kennedy had survived the assassination attempt?
4. What would the world be like if the West wasn't Christian?
5. What would have happened if John Lennon had never met Yoko Ono?
6. What would have happened if the internet had never been created?
7. What would have happened if Leon Trotsky had risen to power instead of Stalin?

This clip is from the movie "On the waterfront". In it, Marlon Brando's character Terry is a working class dockworker who is struggling to make a living and find a job. In his youth he was a very promising boxer but his career was never successful because he was deliberately had to lose fights so that criminals could make easy money by betting against him. Here he is lamenting to his friend that if he hadn't of had to "take dives" (deliberately lose fights) he could have been "somebody", a "real contender". In partners or groups write a story about what could, might, or would have happened if Terry had decided to not deliberately lose these fights.

This poem was written by British Nobel Laureate Rudyard Kipling, in 1895.

If you can keep your head when all about you
Are losing theirs and blaming it on you,
If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you,
But make allowance for their doubting too;
If you can wait and not be tired by waiting,
Or being lied about, don't deal in lies,
Or being hated, don't give way to hating,
And yet don't look too good, nor talk too wise:



If you can dream—and not make dreams your master;
If you can think—and not make thoughts your aim;
If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster
And treat those two impostors just the same;
If you can bear to hear the truth you've spoken
Twisted by knaves to make a trap for fools,
Or watch the things you gave your life to, broken,
And stoop and build 'em up with worn-out tools:

If you can make one heap of all your winnings
And risk it on one turn of pitch-and-toss,
And lose, and start again at your beginnings
And never breathe a word about your loss;
If you can force your heart and nerve and sinew

If you can talk with crowds and keep your virtue,
Or walk with Kings—nor lose the common touch,
